Helpful resources you can use at home

<u>LITERACY</u>

At home you could

- Use lots of different types of pens, pencils, crayons to draw or make marks on different types of paper.
- Begin to write their name please only use a capital letter for the first letter
- Read books together. Talk about the pictures and what is happening in them.
- Let your child see you read too.
- Give your child a shopping list of pictures to help you with the supermarket shop.
- Sing songs and nursery rhymes.
- Listen to the different sounds you can hear. Can you make the sound?

<u>MATHS</u>

At home you could

- Sing counting rhymes.
- Practice counting 1 10
- Ask your child to count objects (to 5) Encourage them to touch them as they count.
- Talk about shapes you see in your house.
- Talk about objects that are bigger and smaller than each other.
- Begin to use words now and next to say what you are doing.
- Begin to talk about where objects are – next to, in, under, on

<u>Other activities</u>

At home you could

- Practise putting coats and shoes on and off.
- Practise using the toilet and washing hands independently.
- Play I spy but use colours instead of letters "I spy with my little eye, something coloured blue"
- Help to write a card for a special occasion.
- Look at photographs of themselves and talk about the occasion in them.
- Visit the park and practise climbing, jumping and balancing.

<u>Literacy</u>

- Looking at print in different forms and realise it has meaning
- Look at books independently, handling them gently
- Begin to talk about stories they hear


• Sound discrimination – Rhythm and rhyme
